St. Patrick Church shares a rich tradition and history, both of its people and buildings. The Church and her people have seen throughout their tenure world wars and peace movements, unspeakable acts of violence, and insurmountable love. Yet, the fundamental values of the church have been maintained through our pastoral leaders, and through our own dedication to prayer, community and faith-filled family life.

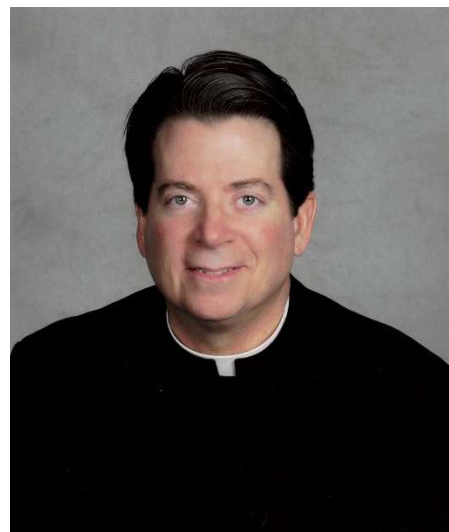
The mission of St. Patrick Church is one of community, clearly outlined in our mission statement. It has called, and continues to call, us all as a community of believers to strive for unification and stronger communal life. This work includes us to be dedicated patrons who work to strengthen our own parish life and the wider community of Christians and non-Christians alike in Council Bluffs and everywhere else we might be.



The responsibility our church has put upon itself is illustrated best by the fourth-grade class of St. Patrick School in 1960. The children were saving for a class Christmas party at a rate of one nickel a week per student. When it came time to celebrate, instead of buying treats for their party with the money they had saved, the students donated the money, a total of \$8.44 to the Goodfellows program with the intent to give their savings to those who needed it more than them during the holiday season.

This idea of stewardship, communal outreach, and parishioner involvement has been practiced since St. Patrick's dedication in the 1920's.

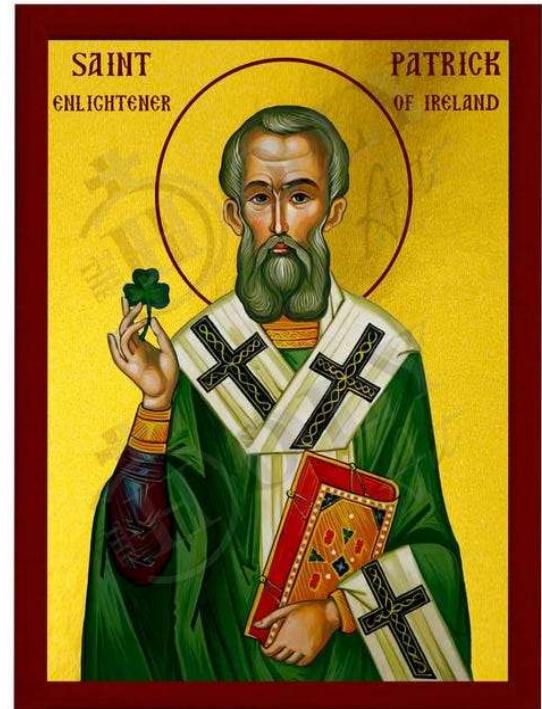


Our Patron Saint

St. Patrick of Ireland is one of the world's most popular saints. He was born in Roman Britain and when he was fourteen, he was captured by Irish pirates and taken to Ireland as a slave. He remained in captivity until age twenty when he escaped after having a dream in which God told him to leave Ireland.

After reuniting with his family in Britain he had another vision that prompted him to study for the priesthood. He was ordained and sent to take the Gospel to Ireland in 433 AD. Patrick was able to convert many people starting with the Druid chieftain. He began building churches across the country.

He often used shamrocks to explain the Holy Trinity and entire kingdoms were eventually converted to Christianity after hearing Patrick's message. Patrick preached and converted all over Ireland for 40 years. He died March 17, 461. While millions around the world celebrate St. Patrick's Day every March 17, the sad fact is that Patrick has never been canonized by the Catholic Church and is a saint in name only.

FIVE PRECEPTS OF THE CHURCH

Quoting from the Catechism of the Catholic Church #2041, "The precepts of the Church are set in the context of a moral life bound to and nourished by liturgical life. The obligatory character of these positive laws...is meant to guarantee to the faithful the indispensable minimum in the spirit of prayer and moral effort, in the growth in love of God and neighbor."

1. "You shall attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor."
2. "You shall confess your sins at least once a year."
3. "You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season."
4. "You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church."
5. "You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church."

TITHING

As the fifth Precept of the Church states, it is our duty, as Catholics, to support the Church. This support comes in various forms of time, talent and treasure. For example, one can donate his or her time as a volunteer for church functions such as the St. Patrick Fish Fries, or offer up one's special talent to make repairs, decorate the church, or assist with religious education.

Certainly, the church needs financial support to cover expenses such as utilities, insurance, altar goods and general church maintenance. With everyone doing his or her part, we can effectively support all the needs of our church.

Weekly collections are taken at each mass on the weekends. Collections for special intentions are taken as a second collection

when needed. Collections for the poor are taken on the weekend of the third Sunday of each month as a second collection.

ANNUAL DIOCESAN APPEAL (ADA)

The ADA is the diocese's yearly call for financial support from each of its parishioners. It helps the bishop provide retirement and health insurance for our active and retired priests, supports seminarians, assists the disadvantaged, and helps serve the basic organizational needs of our parishes and the diocese. The ADA is the main fund drive for our bishop which provides about 50% of the diocesan budget. Please give generously to this collection each Easter.

Weekly giving based on proportion of income

At St. Patrick's, each household is asked to work toward giving 5% of their income to the parish. Some families may have difficulty reaching this goal at first. If so, try increasing your weekly gift incrementally until you reach your goal.

Direct Deposit

People are encouraged to use automatic deposit or tithing envelopes. Tithing envelopes are mailed every other month for those who have registered with our parish. If you prefer to tithe via direct deposit, please see the parish website for on-line giving or contact the parish office to set up an ACH payment on the 5th or 20th of each month. Yearly tithing statements are available for tax purposes prior to January 31st of the following year.

GUIDELINES FOR FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

Fasting

One hour prior to receiving Holy Communion at any Mass fasting is required from all food and drink, with water and medicine being the exception. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and to prepare

Why do we fast?

Fasting is a biblical discipline that can be defended from both the Old and New Testament. Christ expected his disciples to fast (Mt 9: 14-15) and issued instructions for how they should do so (Mt 6: 16 - 18). Catholics follow this pattern by holding a partial fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily his Resurrection.

Abstinence

Abstinence means not eating meat that day. Abstinence is required on special days for people 14 years old and older. As with fasting, medical and health reasons are exceptions.

HOLY DAYS OF OBLIGATION & FEAST DAYS

What's the difference?

Holy days of obligation are feast days on which Catholics are required to attend Mass, and to avoid, to the extent that they are able, servile work. The observance of Holy Days of Obligation is part of the Sunday Duty, the first of the Precepts of the Church. There are currently ten Holy Days of Obligation in the Latin Rite of the Catholic Church: in the United States, only six Holy Days of Obligation are observed.

Abrogation

The number of Days of Obligation vary from year to year, because the precept to attend Mass is lifted (abrogated) if any of the following days falls on a Saturday or Monday.

- Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God
- Feast of the Assumption
- Solemnity of Saints

Holy Days of Obligation 2025

- Wednesday, January 1 - Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God
- Thursday, May 29 - Ascension of Jesus
- Friday, August 15 - Assumption of the Blessed Virgin
- Saturday, November 1 - All Saints Day
- Monday, December 8 – Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary
- Thursday, December 25 – Nativity of the Lord (Christmas)

FAITH FORMATION

First Holy Communion

Two years of classes are required by the diocese. Classes start in first grade and finish at the end of second grade. The sacrament of Holy Communion itself takes place two to four weeks after Easter.

All classes are held at St. Patrick Parish on Wednesday evenings and run mid-September to May. Families must be registered in the parish and are regularly attending Mass for themselves and to help the child learn the sacredness of the Mass.

If your child is older than the typical age for First Holy Communion, special arrangements need to be made.

ATTENDANCE AT PAROCIAHL SCHOOLS DOES NOT QUALIFY AS RELIGIOUS EDUCATION IN PREPARATION FOR FIRST HOLY COMMUNION.

Confirmation

Two years of classes are required by the Diocese of Des Moines for the sacrament of Confirmation. Classes start in ninth grade and finish at the end of tenth grade. (Students who attend parochial schools may postpone attendance until September of their sophomore year; however, there are freshman requirements so please register your ninth graders for Confirmation and stay in communication with the Confirmation Coordinator.) Confirmation classes are held every Wednesday night from 6:30 to 7:45 in the St. Patrick Parish Hall. Our Confirmation ceremony is scheduled by the bishop.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Religious Education is offered on Wednesday evenings during the school year at St. Patrick Church.

- **Grades 1-4** meet Wednesdays, 5:15 to 6:15 p.m., with a 15-minute snack time in the social hall offered beforehand (from 5-5:15 p.m.)
- **Grades 5-8** meet Wednesdays, 6:30 to 7:45 p.m., with a 15-minute snack time in the social hall offered beforehand (from 6:15-6:30 p.m.)
- **9th Grade and 10th Grade Confirmation**
Candidates will meet according to their published calendars on Wednesdays, 6:30 to 7:45 p.m., in the social hall.

We understand that this schedule asks families to be very flexible with their Wednesday evenings and while we would love to accommodate all children all at the same time, there is a lot of behind the scenes work and challenges that make it currently not possible. We feel the benefits of all children attending classes at the church far outweigh the inconvenience of staggered class times. We work together for one another and the greater glory of God!

Although Religious Education is important, it is really the parents who are the first teachers of the faith. Do not underestimate the importance of your example! Attend Mass each week and say prayers before meals and in the evenings as a family. This makes attendance at Religious Education easier for your child as you have prepared them with a respect of the faith and consistent communication with Christ.

ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION FOR ADULTS (OCIA)



OCIA is for those wishing to convert to the Catholic faith and for baptized Catholics who have not received the final sacraments of initiation (First Holy Communion & Confirmation). It is also good for those wanting to help them along the way. OCIA is “one of the best kept secrets” of the Church. It is a privileged time to focus on one’s relationship with Jesus and His Church. Classes are during the school year on Thursdays from 7:00–9:00 pm. Contact Fr. Joel McNeil for more information: 712-323-1484.

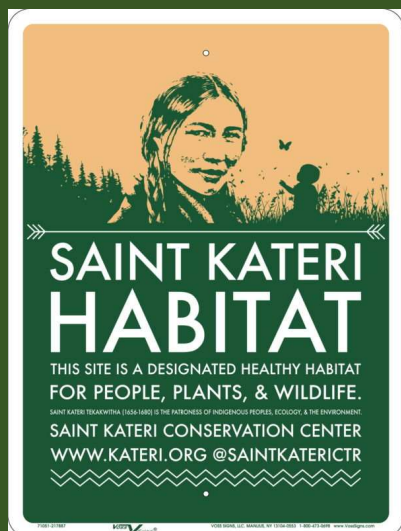
